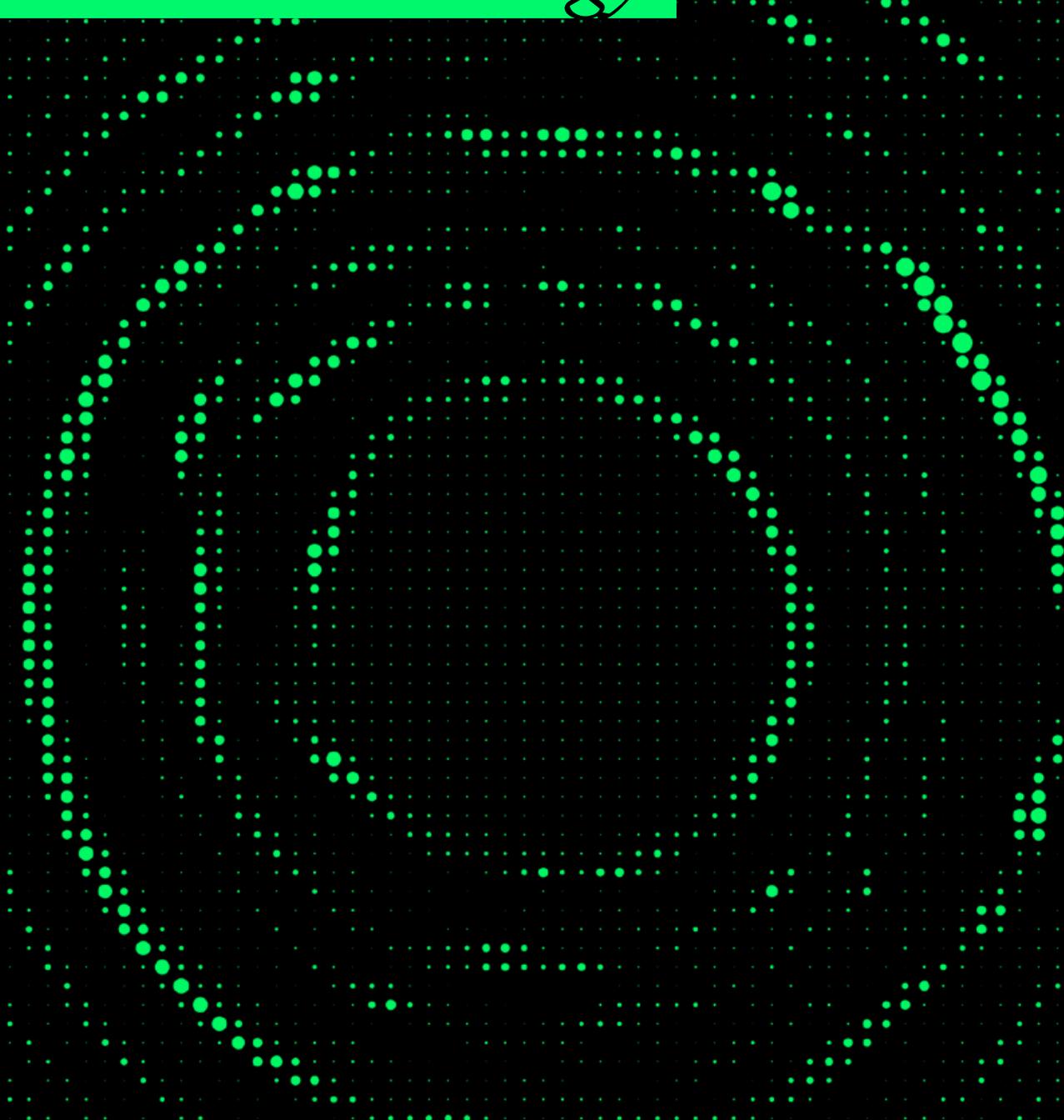


*Key challenges facing  
education technology*



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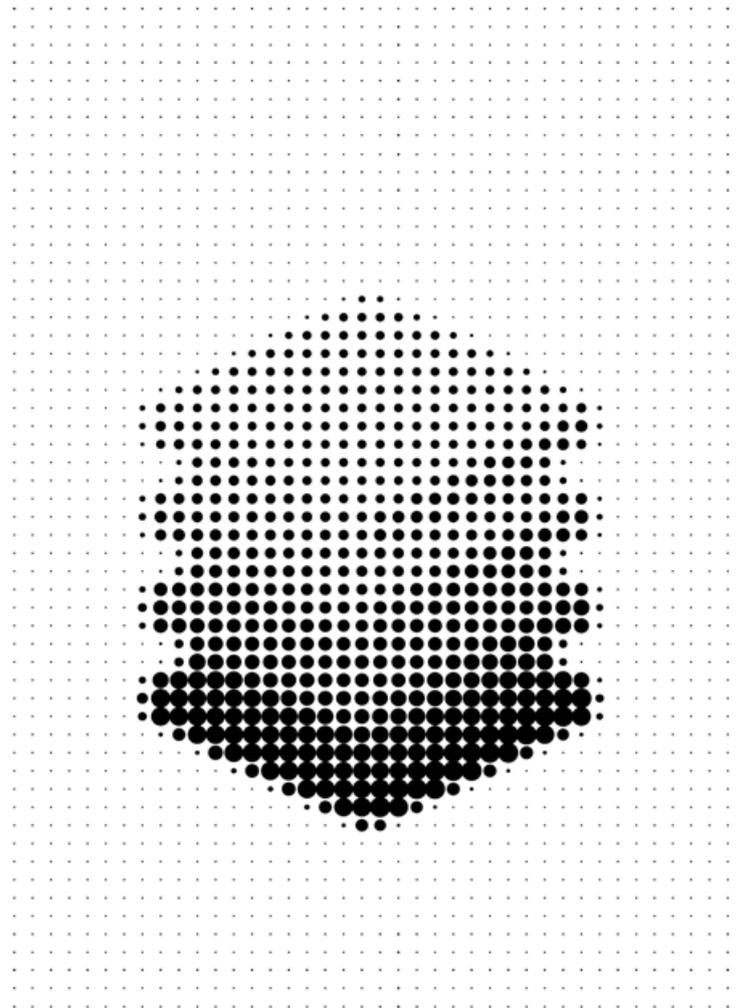
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# Introduction

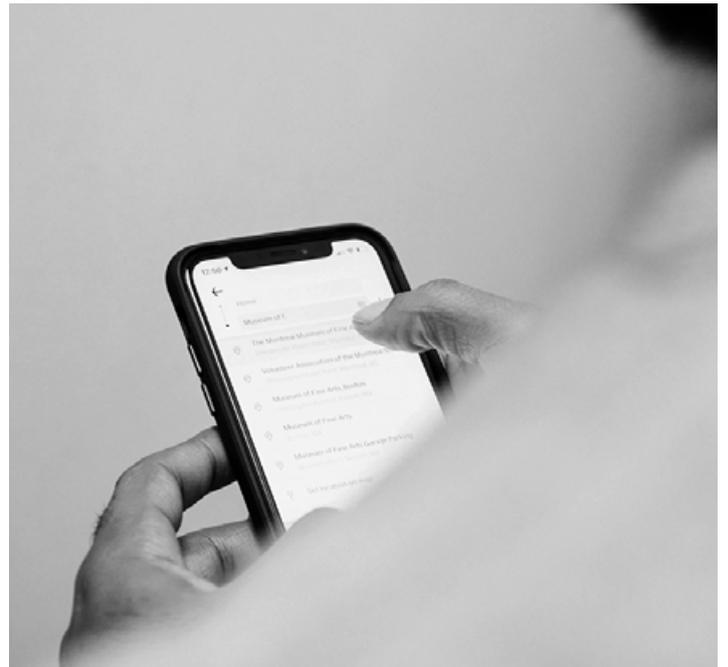
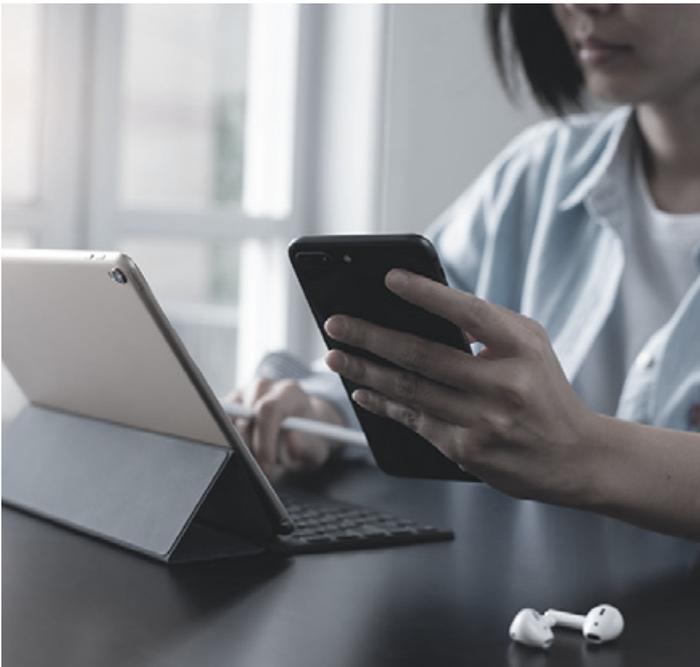


## 1 Resource limitations

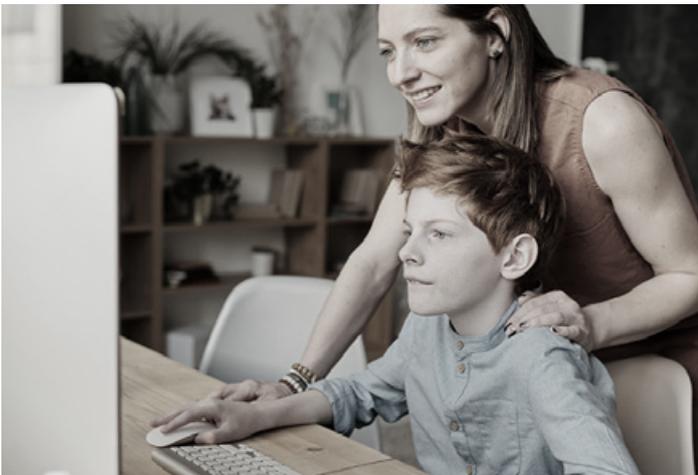
are just a few of the questions and concerns keeping parents up at night.

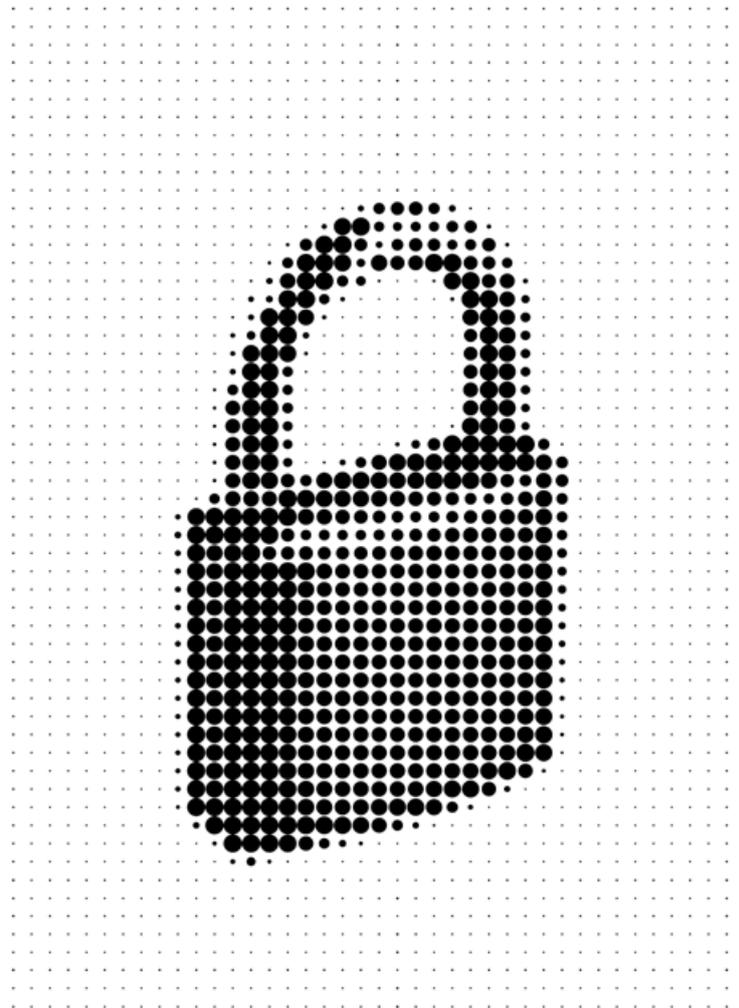
## *Strategies needed to face these challenges head on*
